Collection Statement - Women's Studies

GENERAL PURPOSE

The Todd Wehr Memorial Library aims to support the curriculum of the Women's Studies minor, an interdisciplinary program integrating new developments in history, literature, religious studies, the arts, the health sciences, and the social sciences. Where possible, the Library supports faculty research and course development through acquisitions, interlibrary loan services, and electronic accessibility. The Library encourages use of the collection and electronic services through course-related instruction, orientations, reference services, workshops, and one-on-one interviews.

Degree Programs

The interdisciplinary Women's Studies minor teaches students how to integrate their knowledge by making connections among various fields of learning.

SUBJECT AND LANGUAGE MODIFIERS

Languages - English is the major language of the collection. Titles in Spanish or other languages may be acquired selectively, especially when related to the Latin American Studies minor.

Geographical Areas - Although there is an emphasis on resources from and about North America and Europe, materials are not excluded on the basis of place of publication or population studied. Some Latin American and African material has been collected.

Subjects – As an academic field, Women's Studies examines the often unacknowledged contributions of women scientists, artists, writers, and thinkers, and explores the social, cultural, biological, and psychological aspects of relations between men and women. Feminist perspectives are considered across various disciplines, including history, literature, religious studies, the arts, the health sciences, and the social sciences. Course topics include women writers, sociology of gender, racial and ethnic groups, marriage and family, women in American history, women as leaders, and women's health issues.

Chronological Periods - The main emphasis is on current resources, primarily within the last 25 years. However, significant works by and about women prior to the 21st century are also crucial to the collection. Primary sources by women writers both before and after 1700 are collected.

COLLECTION LEVELS

Description of collection levels, using the CONSPECTUS model.

A Basic Information level currently exists (Level 2), with some topics potentially at a Level 3 (Instructional Support). Moving towards an overall Level 3 is desirable to support the undergraduate minor in Women's Studies, as well as the related majors/minors it supports.

Level 5	Comprehensive Level	A collection in which a library endeavors, so far as it is
		reasonably possible, to include all significant works of
		recorded knowledge (publications, manuscripts, other
		forms), in all applicable languages, for a necessarily defined
		and limited field. This level of collecting intensity is on that
		maintains a "special collection"; the aim, if not the
		achievement, is exhaustiveness. Older material is retained
		for historical research.

DESCRIPTIONS OF MATERIALS COLLECTED

Types of Materials Collected – Monographs, videos, and serials are acquired to support all levels of the program within various disciplines.

Introductory undergraduate works on women's studies, feminism, and gender theory are collected, as well as biographies of notable women in various fields.

Films for the annual Women's Studies Film Festival are acquired on an as-needed basis.

Electronic Databases and Resources – Various databases apply, including PsycInfo, Issues & Controversies, Feminae: Medieval Women and Gender Index, Literature Resource Center, MLA International Bibliography, and Academic Search Complete.

Types of Materials Excluded – None specifically, though as a general rule the Library does not collect college textbooks unless requested by faculty.

Interdisciplinary Factors – Many of the titles purchased for Women's Studies also support programs in Art, Business, Criminal Justice, English, History, Music, Nursing, Psychology, Religious Studies, Theatre, Sociology, Latin American Studies, and Environmental Studies.

COLLECTION REVIEW AND RETENTION

The collection will be reviewed periodically by library staff and faculty to ensure appropriate materials are weeded or maintained. Materials of topical or historical significance may be retained indefinitely or replaced when condition warrants.
