#### **Notes from Our Director**


I have only experienced vertigo twice in my life, most memorably while at home with our oldest daughter who was a toddler at the time. The only thing I wanted to do – the only thing I could do – was lie prone on the floor, feebly attempting to communicate to my child the need to get the phone so I could call for a parental assist from a family friend. Vertigo rendered me incapable of even the most basic functions of caring for my most vulnerable dependent.

The political theorist Iris Marion Young talks about the "vertigo of political responsibility" we experience when faced with the challenge of responding appropriately, constructively to the various forms of injustice that threaten to undermine our commitments to one another as fellow human beings. The dizziness, the loss of balance – the *vertigo* of political responsibility – renders us incapable of caring for each other – especially those with whom we disagree – and for shoring up the most basic functions of our ongoing experiment in democracy.

Love is rarely the word used to describe relations between citizens in a democracy. It seems more appropriate for family and friends. But it is February, a month that has come to represent the contortions and distortions of love in modern society. Robinson's hopeful assessment of the "essence and genius of democracy" is a reminder that if we are to regain a sense of balance, then our shared lives together will require not only a commitment to justice but also a commitment to love.

For reflection: The 2020 political campaigns officially kickoff on Monday with the arcane caucuses in a state I (and Marilynne Robinson) call home. How will you respond to the vertigo of political responsibility? What do you – many of whom are first-time voters – owe one another? What does the democracy you will help sustain look like when "love rises above justice to exceeds its demands"?


