Chi Sigma lota - Delta Lambda Chapter

Chi Sigma lota is the international honor society of professional counseling and for professional counselors. It was established in 1985 through the efforts of leaders in the profession of counseling whose desire was to provide recognition for outstanding achievement as well as outstanding service within the profession. CSI was created for counselors-in-training, counselor educators, and professional counselors whose career commitment is to research and service through professional counseling.

The mission of CSI is to promote scholarship, research, professionalism, leadership and excellence in counseling, and to recognize high attainment in the pursuit of academic and clinical excellence in the profession of counseling.

CSI membership is worldwide. There are currently over 117,000 initiated members. This makes CSI one of the largest single member organizations of professional counselors in the world. 396 chapters have been chartered, and new chapters are being developed in the U.S and other countries as counselor education programs commit to meeting national accreditation preparation standards.

CSI is a member of the Association of College Honor Societies Certified Honor Society (ACHS). ACHS was founded in 1925, it is the nation's only certifying agency for college and university honor societies. ACHS has created standards for organizational excellence and for scholastic eligibility, and not all organizations calling themselves "honor societies" subscribe to the standards of ACHS. Members and the society-atlarge are protected by the standards of excellence set by ACHS. Candidates for membership in CSI can be assured that our society meets the rigorous standards of ACHS.

"In September 2018, we traveled to Pine Ridge, South Dakota to work with the Lakota Oglala tribe. Our goal while at Pine Ridge was to administer depression screenings to adults and adolescents at Wanblee Clinic and Crazy Horse School. We were given the opportunity to collaborate in an integrative care setting, allowing us to provide care alongside physicians, nursing staff, licensed clinical social workers, and school counselors. In addition, our team was able to experience several landmarks significant to the Lakota culture. Community Involvement

The Masters of Science in Mental Health Counseling program has been servicing Salvation Army residents from July 2016 to the present.

During this time we have supervised nine practicum students at the site, and 625 residents have participated in the Life Skills Group which meets every Monday 6:00 -7:00pm at the Salvation Army.

Coulee Council– Four students, two semesters, and provide 6-10 group sessions annually for those recovering.

Salvation Army

Dr. Latten is Site supervisor for MSMHC practicum/intern students at the Salvation Army Downtown, La Crosse. This site serves culturally diverse patients and their families dealing with issues of homelessness, substance abuse, and severe mental illness. From 6/29/15 to date, our program has served 699 Salvation Army residents (and nonresidents) who attended our Life Skills Group or individual counseling by MSMHC students under my supervision. The Master of Science in Mental Health Counseling (MSMHC) program of Viterbo University has been providing mental health services to residence of the La Crosse Salvation Army since June 29, 2016. Recently, we have worked with the Collaborative Care Clinic (CCC) which includes the director Dr. Trannel (Psychiatry), Viterbo's Nursing students, and MSMCH practicum and intern students.

The MSMCH Life Skills Group meets on Mondays from 6 PM to 7 PM. Following group, Individual Counseling is provided (7PM – 8PM) for residents who have signed up. To date, we have served 923 residents in group and individual counseling. Seventeen practicum and 2 intern students have been supervised.

Educational Doctorate in Counselor Education and Supervision

A FIRST!

The Counselor Education department at Viterbo has launched the first the doctoral degree in Counselor Education and Supervision in the state of Wisconsin. The program is designed to meet the growing need for advanced counselor practitioners, educators, and supervisors. Designed for the working mental health professional, and tailored to accommodate MHC alumni, the faculty have designed a relevant doctoral degree, exceeding national standards, that highlight active learning within a counselor education curriculum, a multicultural emphasis, a science-practitioner research model, a competency-based rubric, and a focus on a scope of practice consistent with a doctoral level counselor educator and supervisor.

The initial cohort within the 60 credit-hour, evening and weekend, and year-round program, began spring semester 2019. Under the leadership of Dr. Murray and Dr. Ward, with faculty support from Dr. Jessie Latten and Dr. Stephanie Thorson-Olesen, the program will integrated best practices in counseling, teaching, and supervision, with an emphasis on professional leadership and advocacy. As Dr. Ward noted, "...this program is designed to meet the gap by providing the region with welltrained, ethical, and passionate counselor educators".

Super Saturday Advanced Training Experiences



She informed us on what is needed to care for people who have experienced trauma in their childhood and made it known that it is common in all communities. Symptoms of traumatic childhood experiences can take up to 13 years to show, so it is important to learn about how to manage them. This training is something that would be beneficial for entire communities to hear and use in their practices.
