ADVENT: HUSHED EXPECTATION!

Maybe we could try to live Advent the way it was originally intended: slow..quiet..prayerful..and even penitential. I think the song "Joy to the World" is trying to tell us something: the world is called to receive her King. Well, maybe in order to receive Him, our hearts have to "prepare Him room".

St Francis did just that. We Franciscans are about to celebrate the 800th anniversary (1223) of when the "Poverello" (a famous title for the "joyful poor man") decided to prepare room for the newborn King in his heart. Once, Francis was in the Italian town of Greccio. There he secured the help of the local townspeople to re-construct the first Christmas crib. When they gathered for Midnight Mass, a miracle happened: the Baby Jesus appeared in Francis' arms. People were amazed!

Did it happen out of sentiment or wishful thinking? No. Francis was in the midst of his Advent fast begun after the feast of All Saints. He was praying, reflecting and taking Advent slow..he was preparing room to receive His King...and the King came.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH: SAINT JOHN'S WINE

Advent is over; the Christmas celebration begins.

The first three days after Christmas have ancient liturgical tradition as such. St Stephen, a martyr on December 26; St John, a virgin on December 27; and the Holy Innocents, virgins and martyrs, on December 28. A story associated with Saint John is that he was spared death by surviving poisoned wine. Early Christians would remember this and prayed over blessed wine each year on his feast day. A sample prayer:

"Lord Jesus Christ, you are the vine and the branches, bless this wine + and pour the power of your blessing through the intercession of your apostle John and grant us all good health of body and soul. Let us drink to the love of Saint John! "

2 cups of red sweet wine
2 whole cloves
2 inches stick cinnamon
1 cardamon seed

† tsp nutmeg
Boil the spices in the wine for about 5 minutes. Strain. Serve it hot.





"AH, TAIZE, THAT LITTLE SPRINGTIME"

With these simple words, Pope Saint John XXIII greeted the founder of the Taize, France community, Brother Roger. Later, Pope Saint John Paul II also commented "my desire is that the Lord may keep you like a springtime that blossoms and that He keep you little, in the joy of the Gospel and the transparency of brotherly love." Thus, Brother Roger was affirmed in his desire back in 1940 to live a life of reconciliation with all people. Swiss-born and a Reformed Protestant, he moved to Taize where he could help people surviving the Great War adopt a life of simplicity, prayer and reconciling love. Two other young men joined him, and in 1969, a young Catholic Belgian doctor joined the community creating an ecumenical group of young people dedicated to the call of the reconciliation of all people - especially after such a devastating war.

Their food is simple and their hospitality was and continues to be compassionate and inclusive. Their music, with the help of composers Jacques Berthier and Joseph Gelineau utilizes simple Gospel lines or writings of the saints in a repetitive, contemplative style. Today, thousands of youth pour into Taize to experience the "springtime" of Christian witness which has now grown to many communities around the world.

Viterbo University has responded to His Holiness John XXXIII and his main priority, the reconciliation of all Christians. When immediately after his election in 1958 he requested one of the first audiences to be held was that with Brother Roger and his community, one of the cardinals asked, "Taize? Why so quickly?" The pope responded he was elderly and wanted to respond as soon as possible to the question of reconciliation. Could that it be he already had in mind calling forth a Great Council - a Council that would open up more avenues to Christian Unity. And thus, the Council convened in October, 1962.

Even though every community outside Taize adjusts the spirit of Taize to its particular needs, Viterbo has invited students, staff and all people of good will to join them in their celebration of the dream of Taize within a very Franciscan atmosphere of "peace and good".

You are welcome to join us...and pray "Ut Unam Sint", "That all may be One" in one great prayer for World Peace.


