 - PSYC 171-General Psychology
 - SOWK 275-The Social Work Profession through Service Learning (grade of C or better required)

Health care is a specialized area of social work practice concerned with a person's adjustment to changes in health and the impact this has on a person's life and social network. Health care social workers provide services across the continuum of care and in various settings. They are present in public health, acute, outpatient, residential, chronic care and home care settings providing a range of services including health education, crisis intervention, supportive counseling, case management, alcohol and drug treatment, and mental health services. Social workers work collaboratively with other members of the health care team. Social work in health care is fast paced and challenging.

Skills for Health Care Social Work

The health care social worker is the essential link between the patient, the health care facility (whether hospital, clinic, health department, nursing home, treatment facility, or home care setting), and the community and its resources. Social workers utilize a strengths perspective that recognizes the challenge of illness and loss while uplifting patient and family strengths, empowerment and wellness. Health care social workers have the privilege of interacting with patients and their families at times of enormous vulnerability. Times of medical crisis create windows of opportunity for competent and compassionate social work leaders.



Essential areas of knowledge and understanding for health care social workers include:

- comprehensive, culturally competent assessment and patient-focused intervention/treatment planning
- community resources
- understanding of physiological elements of illness and physical and psychiatric disability
- understanding of substance abuse, mental illness and trauma
- understanding of complex psychological and spiritual needs of patients and families
- ethical and legal questions and dilemmas
- laws, regulations, and policies affecting access to health care
- evidence-based practices and social work research in health care
- needs of special populations
- issues of disparities and oppression across cultures and economic groups in gaining access to and funding for health care
- patient and family advocacy
- crisis intervention, case management, discharge planning

Employment Outlook

The U.S. Department of Labor predicts that employment of social workers is expected to increase by 22 percent during the 2008-2018 decade, which is much faster than the average for all occupations. Social workers with expertise in mental health, substance abuse and gerontology will experience strong demand. Median annual earnings of medical and public health workers were \$46,650 and \$37,210 for mental health and substance abuse workers in May 2008.

Education and Credentialing

A bachelor's degree in social work is the minimum requirement for a social work position in health care. A master's degree in social work (MSW) is required in many health care settings and also for work as a clinical social worker or therapist. All states have credentialing requirements regarding social work practice and the use of professional titles. Social workers should be emotionally mature, objective, and sensitive to people and the challenges they face. They must be able to handle responsibility, work independently, and maintain good working relationships with clients and coworkers.
