FACULTY SPOTLIGHT



David Bauer, Ph.D. Associate Professor Interview by: Megan Baker

1. What area of psychology do vou specialize in?

His background is primarily in behavioral neuroscience/ biopsychology

2. What were some of your favorite/most important classes in college?

He took a lot of Biology and Chemistry courses in college because he was originally pre-med and then switched to a Clinical Psychology focus. His favorite courses included Physiological Psychology, which would be the equivalent to the Brain and Behavior course at Viterbo, and Neuroscience.

3. What classes do you teach at Viterbo?

His primary courses include: General Psychology, Research Methods, Brain and Behavior, Psychopharmacology, Behavioral Neuroscience, and Psychological Testing.

4. Why did you choose to teach at Viterbo? How long have you been teaching here?

This is his eleventh year at Viterbo. His undergraduate experience was at Hope College which is a small, private, liberal arts school. He really enjoyed that type of atmosphere and was looking for something similar. When he got an offer to work on continuing to build and develop the Biopsychology major here, he decided to take the leap.

5. Tell me a bit about one of your recent research projects.

He is beginning a research project on moral judgement development. It is designed to track students at Viterbo to see how their moral reasoning changes over time, with the expectation that it should increase. He is interested in how specific Viterbo experiences might promote that development.

His primary research focus is photobiomodulation, which involves exposing organisms and tissues to specific wavelengths of light that interact with cytochrome c oxidase, an enzyme in the mitochondrial electron transport train. His experiments typically use fruit flies or other model organisms. He exposes them to a toxin, such as cyanide or paraquat, along with a 670 nanometer light treatment. He measures how the treatment affects the organism's lifespan.

6. What is the best advice you've ever been given?

Pursue your passion. Find what you're interested in, and pursue that further. Find courses that align with those interests. Keep your eyes open for experiences you may not have expected.

7. What are some hobbies of yours?

He enjoys outdoor activities, gardening, hunting, landscaping, videogames and gaming. He's big on board games and card games.

8. What is a fond memory of your time at Viterbo?

He enjoys developing interdisciplinary relationships and being able to co-teach courses, for example, with his friends and colleagues in philosophy or biology. The relationships built over-time have been his favorite "memories."

1. What area of psychology do you specialize in?

Her specialty areas are cognitive and developmental psychology. Her degree is in cognitive psychology, with a focus on development. She studies how children learn about the world.

2. What were some of your favorite/most important classes in college?

She always had a desire to work with children in some capacity. The college she attended did not have an education program so she gravitated towards psychology. One class that really sparked her interest was Biopsychology, because she was fascinated with how the brain connects to behavior. Surprisingly, she didn't do well in her Cognitive Psychology class, but that was what she ended up studying in graduate school. She gives that as a lesson to students, that even if you're not doing well in a class, you may find out that you like it.

3. What classes do you teach at Viterbo?

She teaches the developmental psychology classes, including: Lifespan Development, Child and Adolescent Development, and Adult Development and Aging. She also teaches Research Methods and Learning and Cognition.

4. Why did you choose to teach at Viterbo? How long have you been teach-

This is her tenth year at Viterbo. She knew she wanted to be at a small, liberal arts school, which was one of the things that attracted her to Viterbo. When she interviewed here, she really liked the sense of community as well as the mission and location. She hadn't heard of Viterbo before coming here, but fell in love with it when she did.

5. Tell me a bit about one of your recent research projects.

Her most recent research project looks at what children learn about nature and ecosystems as a result of being immersed in a natural setting. Specifically, she is studying children attending a local farm camp in the summer where they get to interact with nature and learn about the relationships between people, plants, and animals in the farm ecosystem. She is looking at how the farm camp experience and other prior experiences with nature, help children learn about ecological relationships. Ultimately, the motivation for this research is to identify what sort of experiences might help children develop eco-friendly practices and sustainable lifestyle choices.

6. What is the best advice you've ever been given?

She was raised with the attitude that "you can do anything that you want to as long as you try and go for it." She thinks that is something that she has carried over into her life—when she sees a challenge, she tries to find a way to surmount it.

7. What are some hobbies of yours?

She enjoys the outdoors; hiking is one of her favorite hobbies. She also enjoys cooking, swimming, reading, and watching movies. Right now, she most enjoys spending time with her young daughter.

8. What is a fond memory of your time at Viterbo?

Her favorite time of the academic year is when her research methods students present their research projects at Viterbo's Scholars' Days event in April. She stated: "It's amazing to see them get to that point and be so proud of the hard work they did all semester and put themselves into a professional setting. They really enjoy it so it's one of those moments when you really feel all of your hard work is paying off."

1. Describe your current position

Director of Education in Counseling and Psychology at The Prairie School, a private school in Racine, WI, for early childhood through 12th grade. My position involves supporting students, families, and staff in their social and emotional growth, development and through struggles.

2. What do you like most about your current position?

Much like my days at Viterbo, The Prairie School acts as a community. I love when students, families and educators work together. When people work in unison in the genuine best interest of a child, great things can happen.

3. Can you describe your path from Viterbo to your current position? What steps and career moves got you where you are to-day?

I earned my Master's Degree in Counseling (St. Mary's University of Minnesota), and my PhD in Counseling and Educational Psychology (Marquette University). My specializations include nonprofit management, working with people who have experienced trauma, and increasing mental health awareness. The largest career move I have made is being willing to address my own challenges and develop self-awareness prior to committing myself to the field. I thank my Viterbo mentor and support (Dr.

Mort Morehouse and Lesley Stugelmeyer) for modeling this during my college years.

4. What was the most beneficial thing you did as a student at Viterbo to prepare you for post-graduation?

The mini-internships and volunteer time that was built into the program was essential to my professional growth. The opportunity to process these experiences with peers and educators in a safe environment allowed me to better understand the field, while building skills, direction and self-confidence.

5. What was the most valuable lesson you learned while at Viterbo?

The most valuable lesson I learned at Viterbo was how to work and be productive with ideas different from my own. To hear varying opinions, perspectives and viewpoints can be very healthy, and is the essence of critical thinking.

6. What is your favorite memory from your time at Viterbo?

My years as the V-Hawk basketball manager are priceless. In addition, winning the Courtyard Carnival Air Band contest in 1990 (I believe). We were KISS! (Rey Eduvas was Ace Frehley, Pat Froiland was Gene Simmons, Chad Childress was Peter Criss, and I was Paul Stanley.)

- 1. What is your favorite thing about being a student at Viterbo? The small class sizes. You get to know your instructors and they get to know you on a first name basis. I learn better in a small environment and the intimate atmosphere drew me to Viterbo.
- 2. Why did you choose Psychology as your major? I love psychology. Since I was little, my dad has talked to me about Carl Jung and Sigmund Freud so it's been a part of my whole life. As I got older, I realized that I could use it and do something with it, not just think it's cool. Then I was really excited to go into it.
- 3. What area of psychology do you find most interesting? Counseling, mental health, and learning about different mental disorders. The fact that psychology is never stuck on one topic and is always expanding into different fields keeps my attention.
- 4. What has been your favorite psychology class at Viterbo so far? I really like Theories of Counseling. That's my favorite because I want to be a counselor and so it was finding which lane I want to go down and what fits best for my type or style of counseling. - 5. Have you completed an internship and/or research project? If so, can you tell me a little bit about it? We examined how self-affirmation ("write 3 most important things in your life") affected reactions to ostracism in a video "cyberball" game and found that it led to lower levels of anger. We are also looking at antecedents of ostracism and what predisposes people to it.
- 6. What are your plans after you graduate? I'm applying to Master's programs in mental health counseling. I don't have a specific area of interest; I just want to help people. I know it's kind of cheesy but it's what I want to do.


