Tara Allert, EdD, LPC, SACIT

Tara Allert is an alumna of Viterbo's three times over! She completed the B.S. in Substance Abuse Counseling (2016), M.S. in Mental Health Counseling (2018), and Ed.D. in Counselor Education and Supervision (2021). She is also an adjunct faculty in both the undergraduate psychology and graduate counseling programs.

How long have you been teaching at Viterbo and what courses do your teach? I have been teaching as an adjunct instructor since Summer 2020. I began teaching at the graduate level in the Master's of Science in Mental Health Counseling (MSMHC) Program. For MSMHC, I have taught Promoting Healthy Lifestyle Choice and Interventions and Integrated Health Care. At the undergraduate level, I have taught Behavior Disorders for the psychology department

What sparked your interest in teaching? Working with really great mentors and professors. I love to connect with students and watch them grow. I work to be as approachable and supportive as possible because I know how vital of a role mentors played in my personal and professional growth. Teaching is an opportunity for me to step into that mentor role for others entering the field.

What do you enjoy most about teaching at Viterbo? I love that Viterbo offers small class sizes – it really allows me to better connect with all students. I also appreciate the support from colleagues as it has contributed significantly to my growth as an educator.

Describe your current position as a professional

counselor. I am currently a school-based therapist (Licensed Professional Counselor – LPC) for Gundersen Health System. I work in the Student Family Assistance Program (SFAP) which is a partnership between Gundersen and the School

District of La Crosse. I am the SFAP provider for the secondary level (all middle and high schools in La Crosse SD). We offer free short-term mental health support and interventions for district students and families. It is a fantastic opportunity for early intervention or to bridge to longer term support.

What do you like most about your current

position? I can collaborate with students, families, educators, and a variety of community agencies to best support adolescent mental health. I am grateful to be a part of a program that supports the mental health needs of students and families in our community. I also continue to work as an adjunct instructor and love to see the growth of students over the course of a semester!

Describe your path from Viterbo to your current position. What steps and career moves got you

where you are today? I applied to the MSMHC program at Viterbo prior to finishing my B.S. in substance abuse counseling because I knew I would need master's-level training to work most effectively as a counselor with individuals struggling with addiction. While in the master's program, I worked with local schools and community agencies. These connections and my work experience in various positions at La Crosse County Human Services influenced my career path, which included working as a therapist at a local private practice for about three years prior to moving into my current role. During this time, I also finished my doctoral studies and began as an adjunct instructor.

What was the most beneficial thing you did as a student at Viterbo to prepare you for postgraduation? I believe the most beneficial thing I did as an undergraduate, but even more so as a

graduate student, was to find great mentors. I have had a handful of extremely influential mentors during my time at Viterbo, leading to many other opportunities and connections. I wish I had been more involved in campus activities or research as an undergraduate student, but I really leaned into that community and those opportunities in my graduate studies.



What is your favorite memory from your time at Viterbo? It is so difficult to pick one favorite memory; however, the best part of my undergraduate experience at Viterbo was most definitely the connections I made with mentors/professors as well as the lifelong friendships I made. I have a number of friends I still stay in touch with from my undergraduate days, and we have endless memories of our time together on campus. Although we are unable to get together often, when we do get together we always pick up right where we left off.

What is something you do for fun (e.g. hobbies, interests beyond teaching)? Some of my favorite things include hot yoga, coffee dates, plants, reading or listening to audiobooks, cooking, and baking. My husband and I also have three kiddos (Beckett, 12; Easton, 9; Ryne, 2). Some of our favorite things to do with our kids include going for bike rides, watching their youth sports, and playing board games.

What advice can you give current or prospective Viterbo psychology students? The

best advice I can give current or prospective students is to get involved and stay connected! Viterbo's smaller class sizes really allows for great mentorship from professors. Connect with professors, peers, and campus groups. Reach out for support and ask to get connected to research and internship opportunities.

FACULTY UPDATES

Stephanie Thorson-Olesen

I conducted a research study with the help of psychology major Ahna Henrickson on Rural Substance Abuse Recovery through the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) program. I also presented research at the 32nd International Congress of Psychology, the American Psychological Association National Convention, and the Association for Counselor Education and Supervision Conference. I was also elected Faculty Council Chair at Viterbo and was presented the David Van Doren Leadership and Service Award from the Wisconsin Counseling Association, a branch of the American Counseling Association.

Michael Parker

This past year I expanded the scope of my research on the psychology of conspiracy theories. My collaborator and I have worked on writing a manuscript for publication, and more recently we were approved for two grants to fund additional experimental research in this area. We hope to test our hypotheses regarding the motivational pathways to adoption of conspiratorial beliefs, and exploratory analysis of the data will focus on predicting confidence in conspiratorial beliefs as well as moderator variables such as dogmatism and authoritarianism.

David Saunders-Scott

I was on sabbatical during the Fall 2021 semester. During my sabbatical, I developed a research project and a new course on the *Psychology of Race, Othering, and Belonging*. My research will explore students' experience of belonging at Viterbo and the extent to which their experience of belonging is associated with college success. I also hope to learn from students, who may have a low experience of belonging, their opinion of the factors that might improve their experience of belonging at Viterbo. Through a multidisciplinary lens, the course will explore the invention of race. Through the lens of psychology, the course will explore how the invention of race leads to othering, and it will use psychological concepts/theories to explore ideas to create communities of belonging.

Liza Ware

I taught a summer course on Applied Psychology and Personal Growth offered to high school members off the Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater La Crosse. It was free to students, thanks to generous support of donors, and helped introduce them to the college experience. It was rewarding to experience the enthusiasm and inquisitiveness of adolescents as they look ahead to their path as college students and adult. I am also co-authoring a manuscript with a graduate of our program, Alexis Bird, on a project she started during her Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship at Viterbo, titled, "The Role of Empathy in Strengthening Children's Connection to Nature." I have also enjoyed becoming more involved in non-profit service, including joining the board of directors of GROW La Crosse, a local organization that connects youth to food and nature through programming such as school gardens and farm camps.

David Bauer

During 2021 I mentored several students conducting independent research in biology, neuroscience, and psychology through various projects. Broadly speaking, the topics included moral judgment, religiosity, personality, political ideology, and longevity. Many of these projects made use of the R programming language and associated software; I continue to develop and instruct skills in these areas (highly recommended for students planning to conduct research in graduate school). I also assumed the role of Chair of Viterbo's Promotion and Tenure Committee.

Bill Bakalars

I continue to teach in the substance abuse counseling minor and the Master's in Mental Health Counseling programs. I am actively involved in Viterbo's VOICE grant (Vital Opioid/Substance Abuse Instruction Through Community-based Experiential Training), including teaching substance abuse courses required for students to receive this funding and planning and participating in Community Conversations and Town Halls. Through these activities and curriculum revision work, I am actively involved in education regarding opioid addiction and medication assisted recovery. I also continue my practice with Mayo Outpatient Behavioral Health about 20 hours per week and consultation duties with Inclusa, a statewide mental health management organization.

Taking opportunities to learn about myself, the campus, the community, and seeking help when needed were the driving factors in walking across that stage.

Advice for psychology majors: Take chances and step outside your comfort zone to learn new skills and gain new experiences while at Viterbo. Whether that is participating in the Psychology Club or other student organizations, or taking on that internship that you may not feel like you are ready for or are scared to try – each of these opportunities will help you recognize the strength, learning, community-focused lens, and transferable, person-centered skills that Viterbo helps to develop in you.

Ahna Henrickson Year in School: Junior Major: Psychology Minor: Substance Abuse Counseling

Why I choose Psychology: I realized I loved to study the brain. I enjoy learning why humans or animals behave or react in certain ways based on the working function of the brain. I also enjoy studying human interaction and thought and behavioral processes.

Favorite thing about being a student at Viterbo: My ability to grow in any direction. At Viterbo, there have been endless opportunities for me, and countless resources and faculty to help me along the way. I enjoy the sense of community and relationships I have gained throughout my time here.

Favorite psychology class: This is a hard choice, but I would have to choose Positive Psychology, Sports Psychology, and Motivational Interviewing. These are my top three only because I was able to learn so much about myself and why I function the way I do. I was also able to learn how to have a healthy and happy lifestyle while recognizing verbal or physical communication cues in myself or others.

Internships/research projects completed: I completed Research Methods I and II and a semester of research with a faculty member that led into the Sumer Undergraduate Research (SURF) program. I conducted three studies: two with classmates and one on my own with a faculty member, revolving around the biases of individuals recovering from addiction and the hardships of living rural while recovering. For my internship, I have been at Driftless Recovery Services working on initial client contact skills, building lesson plans, facilitating group therapy sessions, and eventually AODA (alcohol and other drug abuse) assessments.

Post-graduation plans: I am enrolled in Viterbo's 4+2 program, so I will be rolling straight into the Masters in Mental Health Counseling program. After I complete the bachelor's, I would like to continue working in an outpatient clinic where I can grow my connections and network while gaining more confidence in my counseling style and technique. After graduate studies, I would like to move out of the area to work with other populations and gain experience with the end goal of owning my own practice.

Advice for Freshmen: Ask as many questions as you can think of, never be afraid to venture down a path that you are curious about, join any group that interests you, and don't ever tell yourself that you can't do something. Also, if your heart isn't in your first choice major, don't be afraid to switch. I switched in the first two weeks of school, and I have no regrets about making a choice that I now feel so fulfilled with. Learn all you can, take every opportunity you're faced with, and don't forget to enjoy your time in the process.

Why I choose Psychology: I have always been interested and passionate about people. Majoring in psychology allowed me to expand on this passion while preparing for the work force. Also, coming into college without a super-defined idea of what direction I wanted to pursue professionally, psychology gave me a variety of interesting options.

Favorite thing about being a student at Viterbo: The close-knit community. Having professors and advisors who are willing to go out of their way to assist me has been a huge help academically and professionally as I continue to build my resume and plan for post-graduation.

Favorite psychology class: Social Psychology with Dr. Michael Parker. I learned how different social situations can affect individual and group behavior, which has been useful in both my personal and professional life. I also really enjoyed Interpersonal Communication (Interviewing and Helping Relations) with Dr. Stephanie Thorson-Olesen. The communication skills I learned have been useful in my internship, despite not being in a traditional counseling setting.

Internships/research projects completed: In my research methods class, my group studied the effect of social identity on the relationship between ostracism and conformity. We analyzed previous psychological literature, designed an experiment, gathered and analyzed data from Viterbo University students, and performed a public dissemination of results. This past semester, I completed an internship with Viterbo's Recreation and Leadership Department. In I created, organized, and oversaw a healthy lifestyle group for students. I designed both digital and print marketing campaigns to increase participation and engagement with the group and created social media content centered around healthy lifestyles.

Post-graduation plans: I plan to pursue a master's degree in sport psychology or industrialorganizational psychology or human resource management. As a junior, I am compiling a list of potential programs that interest me and will start the application process over the next few months.

Advice for Freshmen: Start and get involved early. The quicker you begin experimenting with things professionally, the more time you have to change your mind and find where your real passions are. Also, make use of the faculty around you as resources and mentors. They are willing to help and can be a huge help in finding internships, research opportunities, etc.
