How can you help? Sign up to donate supplies, assist in preparing the meal, or help serve the meal at Houska Park.



The format is traditional and historically documented. If you have never been to one, maybe consider attending; it is very prayerful. Mass will be celebrated on the feastday, but there will be a concert of music and prayer for the students earlier in the day. Prayer Wheel Added to FSPA Prayer Garden



The FSPA Prayer Garden, neighboring the chapel, has been enhanced with the addition of a prayer wheel. Visitors are able to place their written prayers inside, which Viterbo campus ministry staff and students will take to St. Rose Convent for members of the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration to pray.

The Sisters provided elements to incorporate into the design. The prayer wheel includes images of St. Francis, St. Clare, St. Rose, St. Rose Convent, and the surrounding bluffs. On the lid are roses and the phrase "Every Moment Thine." The handle represents a flame from the Lard Light.

The prayer wheel was designed and created by Christopher Moench of Bellingham, Wash. and was made possible by a gift from the estate of Viterbo alum, Lucille Pedretti '59. The shelter was designed and constructed by Viterbo employee Dennis Molstad.

St. Francis' Favorite Cookie

History

As strict as he was with food, St Francis had a sweet tooth, according to tradition. In 1212, he made the acquaintance of a widow, Lady



Jacoba di Settesoli, who was very kind to him and the friars. She would offer her home to the friars and even cooked for them—especially a "sweetmeat" called frangipane, a concoction of almonds and sugar. Francis admitted it was his favorite. As years went by, Lady Jacoba continued to assist Francis in his ministry to the lepers and probably joined the secular Franciscans. When Francis lay dying, he whispered to Brother Bernardo to notify Lady Jacoba who appeared at the door of the friary. Despite the cloister, Francis told the brothers to allow "Brother" Jacoba to enter. She entered, knelt at the bed, and unwrapped the napkin she held—and lo and behold, there were his favorite frangipane.

The recipe offered here is one of many. It is more of a custard than a cookie; the Internet has many versions of the latter.

Classic Frangipane

1 cup skim milk

3/4 cup white sugar

1 large egg

1 large egg yolk

1/4 cup all purpose flour

4 tbsp. unsalted butter, softened

1/2 cup almond meal

or ground almonds

1 tsp. vanilla extract

1/4 tsp. almond extract

Bring milk to a boil. Remove from heat and set aside.

Beat ¹/4 cup sugar, egg, and egg yolk together until foamy. Add flour and slowly pour in hot milk beating constantly until smooth and no lumps remain.

Pour the mixture back into the saucepan and slowly bring to a simmer over low heat. Cook, beating constantly to avoid any lumps, until thickened (3–5 minutes). Remove from heat.

Add butter and stir until melted. Add the remaining sugar, almond meal, vanilla extract and almond extract. Cool, stirring every so often to prevent skin from forming.
