TRUTH, BEAUTY, AND GOODNESS

ECAS 100

RESISTANCE AND RECONCILIATION IN SOUTH AFRICA

ECAS 305

South Africa stands witness to the power of social movements. In ECAS 305, students learn how South Africans have drawn on religion, music, and global justice movements to resist and rise from violence, epidemics, climate change, and economic inequities.

Professors Matthew Bersagel-Braley and Erin Jerozal returned with V-Hawks to South Africa in May 2023 after a five-year pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These 15 students, pictured to the left and featured on the cover atop Table Mountain, now join the 50 VU alumni who have made the 9,000-mile journey to the "Rainbow Nation."



PHILOSOPHY FOR CHILDREN

PHIL 244

Professor Jason Howard's Phil 244 course explores the philosophical views behind different theories and methods of education, and the value of philosophy for K-12 education.

Using the illustrated chapter guidebook *Xperiment* by Sharon Kaye, his students have been exploring an innovative philosophy curriculum with fourth and fifth graders at Hamilton Elementary School near the Viterbo campus. *Xperiment* introduces philosophies about human nature, civilization, and justice in the context of real-world situations.

Faculty in the ECAS Department support study abroad programs and internship opportunities, facilitating students to experience other cultures from a broader perspective.

Gretchen Cortez, ECAS art major, visited Zamora, Spain, on a four-week Viterbo study abroad immersion program co-led by Professors Jesús Jambrina and Vickie Holtz-Wodzak. Besides honing her Spanish language skills and exploring her family's Hispanic ancestry, she sketched the natural surroundings of the city for a larger painting project on family, memory, and history.
