# REMEMBERING IN NOVEMBER "TO GIVE THANKS IS TO REMEMBER"

Times and cultures change. All Saints "remembering" used to be celebrated in May when it commemorated only the martyrs. But so many people came to Rome in those early centuries that there wasn't enough food because crops had just been planted. It made more sense to move the celebration to a harvest season because it now included ALL the Saints since Christianity was past the age of the Roman persecutions. November 1 became the first celebration of the month to give thanks and remember all those heroic witnesses to the faith: the martyrs, the monks, priests, sisters, married people and single – and that evening – a Vespers service was held to remember ALL those who have been baptized and are now in God's loving embrace and who long to follow the Saints' example.

November 2 became known as All Souls Day and Christians would (and many still do) venture out to the cemeteries, light candles and pray for their deceased families and friends. The Christian family always honored this tradition with the celebration of Eucharist and in some cultures, it is followed by a noble feasting, such as Mexico's "the Day of the Dead".




# Karuna Inc. Gala

### "November Daze"

Fall in the Midwest is quite a ride. I've been looking for the season for about sixty years. We Weldons moved from south central Iowa in 1963 to the southwest desert of Phoenix. I remember the first Christmas. It just didn't fit. And fifty years later, I'm still hungry for seasons. And finally returned to them.

The move back to the upper Midwest took me to an area on the river I'd never known before. This place where three states come together, a river flows through it and Fall colors it in a way that has eternity shinning thorough.

Forward-thinking Wisconsinites I'm told can tell you when will fall colors peak in their part of the state? Estimates of fall color peak continue to be based on the historical record. But remember the disclaimer: past performance does not necessarily indicate future results.

For example, a strong cold front leading to below-average temperatures could have an effect, said National Weather Service meteorologists say cooler temperatures hasten arrival of fall foliage. By Oct. 17, many northern Wisconsin locations were reporting peak fall color conditions. We Catholic Christians near the end of the liturgical year and the Scriptures point our thoughts toward ultimate things. In the northern hemisphere, nature itself prompts us to reflect on the end of life and questions about the afterlife. Our usual tendency is to focus only on the immediate future and our immediate goals. The fall colors take us to the horizon of life.

Wisconsin's peak autumn season fits well with this month's focus on death, which is the reality that relativizes everything else in our lives. Many things that seemed so important fade into insignificance as death's colors approaches. But this year it also fades into a national election.

A friend of mine made a very interesting comment about a politician for the coming election. "YOU KNOW, HE DOESN'T HAVE HIS DUCKS IN A ROW." It means there are some empty spaces in the brain when he tries to talk about certain issues. Against the foliage and weather changes, voting has never meant more. The more who do, the closer we get to the common good of this nation. The colorful shape behind our national life, structures and leadership. There is a sacred sense to voting. I skip the polls. I think a lot are this election season. Posters usually call at dinner time. My phone is guaranteed to be off. Anyway, it's nobody's business where I decide to put my vote. My hope is that it will make a difference. My hope is that we will choose a servant leadership candidate. One that will encourage transformation to common cause and common good. The transformation hopefully is to "the angels of his, (sic our) better nature," as Abraham Lincoln once said. We are all struggling to get our ducks organized and rowed. But in the meantime, everyone has something to give. And something worth listening to.

All Saints and All Souls sets this November daze in a direction toward the "Eschaton," a bid theological word for the Age that is to come. To remember those who have gone before us and to face honestly the horizon of our own deaths takes courage and focus. Rather than prompting morbid thoughts, the liturgy of this season invites us to look forward to eternal life in God. For those left behind, of course, death brings grief, but our faith assures us that our separation from loved ones is only temporary if we live and die in the Lord. Enjoy the turn of season with a turn of life. It makes for a beautiful horizon.

# Soul Cakes

Soul, Soul, a soul cake!
I pray thee, good missus, a soul cake!

### INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cake yeast
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 cups scalded milk
- 6 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 beaten egg
- Powdered Sugar (to Sprinkle)

### DIRECTIONS

Dissolve yeast in water with one tablespoon sugar. Cover and allow to rise until light. Cream butter and remaining sugar. Add scalded milk. When mixture is lukewarm, add yeast and sifted dry ingredients. Knead into a soft dough. Let rise until double in bulk. Shape into small round or oval buns. Brush tops with egg. Bake on greased cookie sheets in a hot oven (400°) for 15 minutes. Turn oven down to 350° and bake the cakes until golden brown. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Who was St. Cecilia?


Cecilia was born during the second century to a wealthy family. Despite being Christian, her parents had her marry a pagan.

Patron Saint: musicians, poets, hymns





C. Vanessa White is Associate Professor of Spirituality and Ministry at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and Director of the Certificate in Black Theology and Ministry. She holds a dual appointment as Associate Director of the Th.M. Program (Master of Theology) at Xavier University's Summer Institute for Black Catholic Studies. She has a Master of Theological Studies with emphasis in Mission and Cross-Cultural Studies (1991). and a Doctor of Ministry with a concentration in Spirituality (2005) from Catholic Theological Union. She pursued further post-graduate studies at Loyola University Chicago and Xavier University of Louisiana.

A professed member of the Secular Franciscan Order, she also holds memberships in the Catholic Theological Society of America (CTSA), the American Academy of Religion (AAR) the Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality and the Black Catholic Theological Symposium (BCTS). She is also a member of the National Black Storytellers Association as well as the National Association of Storytellers. She was appointed delegate for the Intercontinental Stage of the Synodal Process where she continues to remain active in promoting synodality.
